These awards have launched many careers within the profession and the event continues to be the backbone of the industry's calendar of events. ROYAL PATRON HRH PRINCESS MICHAEL OF KENT



Since time immemorial, women – and often men – have liked to adorn themselves with jewellery. In ancient times jewellery was made from dried stones of fruit and vegetables, stones found in river beds or seams of semi-precious material dug out of their mother stone. Gold was also found in river beds and in some early societies, it was in plentiful supply. In Egypt there was so much gold that people preferred silver and medieval merchants made huge profits exchanging silver for gold pound for pound. When gold was first found, early civilisations quickly realised its qualities – it was soft and malleable; it did not tarnish; it could be used in medicines. Gold and silver could be used not only for making jewellery but also vessels for drinking and plates for eating or display. The worth of gold and silver was established early and throughout history, gold has been desired, given, stolen and fought over.

Since early Christian times in Europe, and much earlier in the East, pharaohs, rulers, magnates, khans and chieftains who did not find sufficient gold in their lands would encourage alchemists to turn base metal into gold. Of course, none succeeded. But those communities that had a source soon began to be creative with gold and silver to adorn themselves. One only has to look in museums for Inca gold work, or the jewellery of the ancient Egyptians, Phoenicians, Greeks, Romans. The work produced during Medieval times, the Renaissance, the glorious jewellery of the Ottoman courts, the Persians – the list is endless and continues into modern times when the ingenuity of artists is as alive and innovative as ever.

Today it is mainly women who wear jewellery, especially set in gold, but men know what pleasure it gives their ladies, even if they do not wear much themselves. Happily, the beauty of gold and silver continues to entrance and the creative mind of jewellers continues to produce glorious pieces for the pleasure of many.

The Goldsmiths' Craft & Design Council has, for over 100 years, supported the craft of the jewellers and goldsmiths responsible for producing these works of art. Its remit, 'to encourage, stimulate and promote the pursuit of excellence in craftsmanship and design among all those in the United Kingdom who work within silversmithing, goldsmithing, jewellery and the allied crafts', is as relevant today as it ever has been.

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LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD 2017







The Goldsmiths' Craft & Design Council gives the Lifetime Achievement Award Medal (LAA) in recognition of a recipient's outstanding contribution and commitment to the craft and industry of Silversmithing, Jewellery and the Allied Crafts. This year the Council's LAA goes to:

Caroline Broadhead

Following her foundation course Caroline Broadhead completed a Diploma in Jewellery Design at the Central School of Art and Design in 1972. She then set up a jewellery studio in London's Covent Garden. During the 1970s Caroline made a significant contribution to the 'New Jewellery' movement where a visit to Africa greatly influenced her to create jewellery that extended the form of the body.

Making jewellery for a living Caroline soon found this conflicted with her desire to experiment with ideas and materials. From jewellery her work developed into larger scale pieces and in the 1980s Caroline concentrated on conceptual aspects of clothing and installation art. This was an exciting time where she examined spatial awareness of the body in new ways.

Best known for her use of garments, often creating fragile installations that incorporated ephemeral dress structures; the garments and their shadows become the delicate borderline between the self and the rest of the world as well as signifiers of bodily presence/absence.

Collaborations with choreographers from 1990 onwards allowed Caroline to explore an interest in the way objects inspired gestures in more dynamic ways, integrating design and movement in dance performances.

'My work is mainly driven by ideas but making and materials are an integral part of the process. You can't make things without considering the craft of it.'

A number of works were commissioned for historic buildings, such as the promenade performance, The Waiting Game made with Angela Woodhouse in Upnor Castle, Kent, as well as installations; Breathing Space, York St Mary's and recently; Above Below in Bath Abbey. These works referenced and responded to the histories and circumstances of their surroundings. Caroline's continued interest in jewellery led her to curate shows about current practice including; New Tradition, at the former British Crafts Centre, London and; Then and Now, Marsden Woo Gallery, London.

Caroline has received many awards for her work including a Crafts Council Bursary in 1982 to work in Amsterdam. She also won the 'Jerwood Prize for Applied Arts: Textiles' (1997). Her work is held internationally in prestigious collections, including Kyoto Museum of Modern Art, Japan, the Victoria and Albert Museum, London and the Museum of Arts and Design, New York, USA.

Alongside her own practice Caroline has taught textiles, jewellery, and other design disciplines at Brighton Polytechnic, Middlesex University, Goldsmiths College and Salzburg Summerakademie.

Presently, Caroline is the course Leader for BA Jewellery Design and Programme Director for Jewellery and Textiles at the internationally renowned Central Saint Martins. Her dynamic influence has greatly contributed to making the course a leading light in jewellery design and she has nurtured and developed some of the best designers and craftspeople in our industry.
